The newbie guide

So, if you're reading this, this is probably your first conference. You are in your smart suit or dress or costume or whatever you decided is formal enough for this occasion. Hopefully, you are excited and maybe a bit scared. You probably had some kind of schooling or training and are waiting to put your knowledge into action. There is only one problem: The rules of procedure are complex and hard to remember and what you have been told might not be enough. Every conference is slightly different. But do not panic, we are here to help you out.

First things first. There is good news. You can always ask the delegate next to you or even better your chairs. Most people are happy to share their knowledge! Besides, it is your chairs' job to answer your question. Do not hesitate to ask, because that's what they're there for. Most chairs will even ask if they have first timers in their committee, just to keep an eye on them and help them out if necessary.

Okay. But what if the worst-case scenario occurs: There's nobody around you to ask because everyone is busy? That will probably not happen, but it gives me the opportunity to share another important tip with you. It is quite simple. Just watch what everyone else is doing. So don't be afraid to make mistakes, that's normal. The rules of procedure and everything else you need to know will come naturally to you during the debate.



Sample Resolution

UNEP Committee

Sponsors: Belgium, France

Signatories: Croatia, Iceland, Turkey

Topic: The question of holding multinational corporations accountable for environmental degradation in developing countries

The UNEP Committee

Acknowledging the significant contribution of multinational corporations to the global economy and development,

Recognizing the environmental impact of industrial activities, particularly in developing countries where regulatory frameworks may be less stringent,

Conscious by the ongoing environmental degradation that disproportionately affects vulnerable communities in these regions,

Reaffirming the principles of sustainable development and corporate social responsibility,

Noting the importance of international cooperation and robust legal frameworks to ensure accountability and environmental protection,

- 1. Emphasizes** all countries to strengthen and enforce environmental regulations to prevent and mitigate the impact of corporate activities on the environment;
- 2. Recommends** the establishment of an international framework for the monitoring and reporting of environmental practices of multinational corporations;
- 3. Calls** for multinational corporations to engage in transparent and sustainable business practices, including regular environmental impact assessments and public reporting;
- 4. Encourages** the implementation of the "polluter pays" principle, ensuring that corporations are held financially responsible for the environmental damage they cause;
- 5. Supports** the development of capacity-building programs in developing countries to enhance local regulatory agencies and provide them with the necessary resources to enforce environmental laws;
- 6. Requests** the UNEP to facilitate knowledge-sharing platforms where best practices in corporate environmental responsibility can be shared between nations;
- 7. Emphasizes** the importance of stakeholder engagement, including local communities, in decision-making processes related to industrial projects;
- 8. Calls** upon developed nations to provide technical and financial assistance to developing countries for the implementation of green technologies and sustainable practices;
- 9. Encourages** the creation of an international tribunal to address disputes and hold corporations accountable for transnational environmental harm.

Motions

Motions are one way of moving on in a debate.

A motion makes it possible for you to entertain a resolution, get lobbying time or move into voting procedure.

Any motion requires at least one ‘second,’ meaning that at least one other person must agree to the motion. If you don’t want a motion to happen, you can call “objection”. This forces you to take the floor and explain your objection.

Motion	Meaning
Motion to move into lobbying time	Asking for lobbying time to convince other delegates of your resolution.
Motion to move into time in favor	If you are debating a resolution or amendment and want to speak in favor it, but you are in time in favor/or else
Motion to move into time against	If you are debating on an resolution or amendment and you want to speak against it but you are in time in favor/or else
Motion to move into voting procedure	If you want to vote about a resolution or amendment. You have to be in time against.
Motion to entertain a resolution	If you are in an open debate and want to discuss your resolution.
Motion to entertain an amendment	If you want to change something in a resolution that is discussed. You need to be in time against and fill out an amendment sheet, which you sent to your chairs.



Dress Code

Munelly is a formal and serious event. All persons participating in the conferences are required to wear formal clothing, such as suits, blouses, skirts and dresses.

When wearing skirts and dresses, it should be noted that these may not be shorter than two centimeters above the knee.

Appropriate shoes during the conferences are high heels, ballerinas, patent leather shoes or clean white, gray or black sneakers.



Important things to keep in mind...

1. Every participant of the conference and the school staff must be treated with respect.
2. All delegates must follow the orders of the chairs and respect the decisions they make.
3. Please make sure you have an opening speech ready.
